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WAIVER AND RELEASE

Guidelines for Waiver Registration

IT IS A REQUIREMENT OF YOUR INSURANCE COVERAGE THAT ALL PERSONS ENTERING A RESTRICTED AREA READ, COMPLETE AND SIGN THE WAIVER AND RELEASE.

PLEASE FOLLOW THESE INSTRUCTIONS TO MAINTAIN VALID INSURANCE. THE FAILURE TO IMPLEMENT A WAIVER AND RELEASE SYSTEM WILL NEGATE CERTAIN IMPORTANT INSURANCE COVERAGE.

1. **USE ONLY RELEASE FORMS PROVIDED BY YOUR INSURANCE COMPANY**
2. **YOUR INSURER REQUIRES THAT ALL WAIVERS ARE TO BE COMPLETED ELECTRONICALLY.**
. You are encouraged to visit their site: <https://speedwaiver.com/stoneridge> to register your account. ALLOW UP TO A WEEK TO REGISTER
3. **HAVE THE SAME PEOPLE HANDLE SIGN-INS AT ALLEVENTS.**
They will become more consistent in handling releases. Be sure pit gate personnel verify the photo matches the person presenting their electronic waiver.
4. **BE SURE PIT GATE IS MANNED THOUGH ENTIRE EVENT.**
Do not allow security or pit booth personnel to go off duty before the event is complete.
5. **BE SURE PIT GATE STAFF KNOWS WHAT TO TELL PERSONS ASKING WHAT THEY ARE SIGNING.**
Suggestion: "This is a release and waiver of liability. It means you are entering a restricted area at your own risk, and accept total responsibility for anything that may happen to you."
6. **BE SURE EVERYONE ENTERING PITS/RESTRICTED AREAS SIGNS A RELEASE.** Include employees, press, guests, sponsors, drivers, crew/team members.
7. **DO EVERYTHING YOU CAN TO BE SURE EVERYONE KNOWS THEY ARE SIGNING A RELEASE.**
Display release prominently, in all busy areas: pit restrooms, refreshment stands, tech/scale area, pay window, etc. Mail release copies with annual memberships or include in newsletters. IMPORTANT! Show and discuss release at pit meetings. Make large blow-ups of release with sign, "THIS IS THE RELEASE YOU SIGN – KNOW WHAT IT SAYS!" and post them at pit entrance and other locations (preferable lighted). Use a moving message sign at the pit window, that repeats, "YOU ARE SIGNING A RELEASE...KNOW WHAT IT SAYS...COPIES ARE AVAILABLE." Imprint pit passes with a message of this type: "WARNING! The holder of this pit pass acknowledges signing the release and waiver, in exchange for admittance to the restricted areas. By signing, holder has waived certain legal rights, and acknowledges the potentially dangerous nature of activities in and adjacent to restricted areas.
8. **NEVER ALLOW MINORS TO SIGN THE ADULT WAIVER**
9. **MAKE SURE YOU KNOW AND FOLLOW PROPER PROCEDURES FOR MINOR RELEASES**
Make sure both parents sign the parental release. THIS MEANS BOTH PARENTS (It is acceptable to have the parental waiver and release signed on an annual basis). If a minor's parents do not live together, or live in different communities, both must still sign the parental release, so youthful entrants may have to go through some trouble to become eligible for competition. proper ID when. On each race night, make sure every parent who accompanies a minor signs the adult waiver

The Participant acknowledges and agrees to the terms outlined in this document.

PARENT(S)/GUARDIAN(S)

When the Participant is under the age of majority, the Participant's parent(s)/guardian(s) acknowledge and agree to the terms on behalf of the Participant and references in this Agreement to the Participant agreeing to or acknowledging a risk or term is understood to be referring to the Participant and the Participant's parent(s)/guardian(s) agreeing to or acknowledging the risk or term on behalf of the Participant.

In full or partial consideration for allowing the Participant to participate in all related Activities of the Event, the parent(s)/guardian(s) warrant and agree:

1. To have full legal responsibility for decision making regarding the Participant.
2. They are familiar with and accept, on behalf of themselves and the Participant, that there is risk of serious injury and death in participation, whether as a competitor, student, official or worker, in all forms of motor sport, but not limited to, being allowed to enter, for any reason, any restricted area.

ACTIVITIES

The Participant is voluntarily participating in the motor sports and the Activities of the [Insert legal name of Organization]. The Activities are defined as and may include but are not limited to including spectating, orientation, instruction, practice, training, competitions, races, rides, orientational or instructional sessions or lessons, aerobic and anaerobic conditioning programs, the sport of racing, including but not limited to, go-karting, motorcycles, race teams and clubs, driving schools, major motorsport facilities, oval track racing, drag racing, racing clubs and associations and touring events (collectively the "Activities").

RISKS

The Activities have foreseeable and unforeseeable inherent risks, hazards and dangers that no amount of care, caution or expertise can eliminate, including without limitation, the potential for serious bodily injury, permanent disability, paralysis, and loss of life. These risks include:

- a) Ability: failing to act safely or within the Participant's own ability or within designated areas
- b) Advice: negligent advice regarding the Activities
- c) Collisions: collisions or crashes with other racers, vehicles, barriers, obstacles, signs
- d) Contact: contact with participants, equipment, or other persons or racers; and other contact that may lead to serious bodily injury, including but not limited to concussions and/or other brain injury or serious spinal injury

- e) Conduct: the Participant's conduct and conduct of other persons including any physical altercation between participants
- f) Fire and Explosions: fire, explosions and burns
- g) Health: executing strenuous and demanding physical techniques; physical exertion; overexertion; stretching; dehydration; fatigue; cardiovascular workouts; rapid movements and stops; lack of fitness or conditioning; traumatic injury; sprains and fractures, spinal cord injuries, bacterial infections; rashes; and the transmission of communicable diseases, including viruses of all kinds, COVID-19, bacteria, parasites or other organisms or any mutation thereof
- h) Injuries: Injuries such as death, serious neck and spinal cord injuries which may render the Participant permanently paralyzed or brain damaged; serious injury to virtually all bones, joints, ligaments, muscles, tendons and other aspects of the body; and concussions or other head injuries, including but not limited to, closed head injury or blunt head trauma
- i) Premises: defective, dangerous or unsafe condition of the facilities; falls; collisions with objects, racers, vehicles or barriers that are a part of the Event; and travel to and from the premises
- j) Sport: motor racing and its inherent risks, including but not limited to high speeds, wet surfaces, intrusion, fire, explosions, collisions, and crashes
- k) Use of equipment: mechanical failure of the equipment; negligent design or manufacture of the equipment; the provision of, or the failure by, the Organization to provide any warnings, directions, instructions or guidance as to the use of the equipment; failure to wear safety or protective equipment; and failure to use or operate equipment within the Participant's own ability
- l) Travel: travel to and from the Activities

Negligence. The Organization may be negligent, which may include failure by the Organization to take reasonable steps to safeguard or protect the Participant from the risks, dangers and hazards associated with participation in the Activities.

TERMS

In consideration of the Organization allowing the Participant to participate in the Activities, the Participant agrees:

- a) That the Participant is not relying on any oral or written statements made by the Organization or their agents, whether in a brochure or advertisement or in individual conversations, to agree to participate in the Activities
- b) That the Participant's mental, emotional and physical condition is appropriate to participate in the Activities and the Participant (or the Participant's parent/guardian, if applicable) assumes all risks related to the Participant's mental and physical condition
- c) To comply with the rules and regulations for participation in the Activities
- d) To comply with the rules of the facility or equipment as well as any directions or instructions from the Organization
- e) That if the Participant observes an unusual significant hazard or risk, the Participant will remove themselves from participation
- f) That the Organization may secure transport to emergency medical services as it deems necessary for the Participant's immediate health and safety, and that the Participant shall be financially responsible for such services
- g) The risks associated with the Activities are increased when the Participant is impaired, and the Participant will not participate if impaired in any way
- h) That it is the Participants sole responsibility to assess whether any Activities are too difficult for the Participant. By the Participant commencing an Activity, the Participant (acknowledges and accepts the suitability and conditions of the Activity
- i) That the Participant is responsible for choosing the Participant's gear, equipment, safety or protective equipment and the secure fitting of that equipment
- j) To remove themselves and notify the nearest official, if at any time the Participant senses or observes any unusual hazard or unsafe condition or if the Participant feels they have experienced any deterioration in their physical, emotional or mental fitness; or that of their protective clothing, gear or equipment
- k) That the Participant is fully responsible for any loss of personal property and any costs associated with any related loss
- l) This Agreement will be construed in governed by the laws and courts of the Province or Territory where the Activities occur

DISCLAIMER

The Participant acknowledges and agrees:

- a) To an unqualified assumption of all risks arising out of, associated with or related to, participation in the Event and the Activities and waives all claims that the Participant may have now or in the future against the Organization.
- b) To accept and fully assumes all such risks and possibility of personal injury, death, property damage, expense, and related loss, including loss of income, resulting from participation in the Activities.
- c) To forever indemnify and release the Organization from any and all liability for any and all claims, demands, actions, damages (including direct, indirect, special and/or consequential), losses, actions, judgments, and costs (including legal fees) (collectively, the "Claims") which the Participant has or may have in the future, that might arise out of, result from, or relate to, participation in the Activities, even though such Claims may have been caused by any manner whatsoever, including but not limited to, the Organization's negligence, gross negligence, negligent rescue, omissions, carelessness, breach of contract and/or breach of any statutory duty of care of the Organization, including any compounding or aggravation of injuries caused by negligent rescue.



- d) To provide a FULL AND FINAL RELEASE AND WAIVER OF LIABILITY AND ALL CLAIMS the Participant has, or may in the future, against any person(s), entities or organization(s) associated in any way with the Organization or the Event, including the track owners and lessees, promoters, sanctioning bodies, racing associations, or any subdivision thereof, track operators, sponsors, advertisers, car owners and other participants, rescue personnel, event inspectors, underwriters, consultants and others who give recommendations, directions or instructions or engage in risk evaluation and loss control activities, regarding the Organization or the Event or event premises, or any one or more of them and their respective directors, officers, employees, guides, contractors, agents and representatives (all of whom are collectively referred to as "the Releasees") from any and all liability for any loss, damage, injury or expense that the Participant may suffer as a result of their use of or presence at the Event facilities or participation in any part of, or presence in any capacity at, the **EVENT**, due to any cause whatsoever, INCLUDING NEGLIGENCE, GROSS NEGLIGENCE, BREACH OF CONTRACT, OR BREACH OF ANY STATUTORY OR OTHER DUTY OF CARE, INCLUDING ANY DUTY OF CARE OWED UNDER THE RELEVANT OCCUPIERS LIABILITY ACT ON THE PART OF THE RELEASEES.
- e) NOT TO SUE THE RELEASEES whether directly or indirectly from the Participant's participation in any aspect(s) of the **Event**; and
- f) To SAVE and HOLD HARMLESS the RELEASEES, and each of them, from any litigation expense, legal fees, liability, damage, award or cost, of any form or type whatsoever, they may incur due to any claim made against them or any one of them by the Participant or on the Participant's behalf, or that of the Participant's estate, whether the claim is based on the negligence or the gross negligence of the Releasees or otherwise as stated above.

SEVERABILITY

The Participant acknowledges and agrees that if any provision in this Agreement is declared invalid by a court of competent jurisdiction, such provision will be ineffective only to the extent of such invalidity, illegibility or unenforceability so that the remainder of that provision and all remaining provisions will be valid and enforceable to the fullest extent permitted by applicable law.

ACKNOWLEDGMENT

The Participant acknowledges that they have read and understand this Agreement, that they have executed this Agreement voluntarily, and that this Agreement is to be binding upon themselves, their heirs, spouse, children, parents, guardians, next of kin, executors, administrators and legal or personal representatives. They further acknowledge that by signing this Agreement they have waived their right to maintain a lawsuit against the Organization on the basis of any claims from which they have released herein.

INCIDENT HANDLING GUIDELINES

When a person at the event goes down with an injury – and whether attention is given by an usher, nurse, EMT or other assigned personnel, both the injured person and the situation need to be evaluated and stabilized, whether it is until the ambulance arrives and takes over, until the person can be taken to the First Aid room for care and observation, or until the person refuses care and/or elects to return to the event without further attention. Regardless of the scenario and which personnel, there are a number of do's and don'ts while attending to the injured person's needs. Among them:

- ☐ **Don't** accept or even suggest fault for the incident
- ☐ **Don't** make any promises about anything
- ☐ **Don't** make payment or say his/her medical bills will be paid
- ☐ **Don't** give any information about your insurance coverage
- ☐ **Don't** recommend any medical facility unless told to do so
- ☐ **Don't** reflect an attitude of boredom, nuisance, or importance
- ☐ **Don't** argue or patronizingly agree with any disagreeable comments by the injured person
- ☐ **Don't** leave the person unattended until transferred to health or security personnel in the pre-authorized manner or release at their own request
- ☐ **Don't** fail to observe and record any significant circumstance
- ☐ **Don't** hesitate to correct any hazardous situation (e.g., wet spot) as soon as reasonable after attending to the person
- ☐ **Do** give respect and appropriate attention to the stricken person
- ☐ **Do** assist within the local system of obtaining and recording the relevant information about the incident on the Report Form being used for this track
- ☐ **Do** contact security of other designated personnel so that an investigation and warranted controls/remediations can be launched without unnecessary delay
- ☐ **Do** ask the person what he/she believes happened and record such in his/her own words, if at all possible.
- ☐ **Do** note in the report, if observable circumstances differ, or reflect in any way on, what the person is claiming
- ☐ **Do** note in the report if the person is noticeable upset or actually complaining about the cause of his/her accident.
- ☐ **Do** give respect to any complaint
- ☐ **Do** report the incident to StoneRidge Specialty. In the case of fatality, spectator injury or serious participant injury call 1-226-318-1744 immediately and provide details.

Complete all sections in as much detail as possible and attach additional pages if necessary, such as a copy of the waiver, observer's report, etc. Please contact StoneRidge Specialty Insurance if you need further information.

1. Complete an Incident Report for:

ALL INJURIES

Any physical injury, including when a driver sustains a hit hard enough to possibly result in soft tissue injury or lacerations he/she might be injured. NOTE: Minor injuries (bee stings, small cuts, scrapes, etc.) sustained off-track (in paddock, garages, offices, etc.) and not involving a moving vehicle or spectator should also be reported.

2. Obtain original Releases and Waivers signed by injured party(ies). Do not send original until directed.
3. For any spectator injury, fatality or serious participant injury, obtain at least two (2) eyewitness reports.
4. Return the completed form along with the following:
 - a) Copy of the completed and signed event waiver;
 - b) Copy of the completed and signed parental consent/minor waiver (if applicable);
 - c) Written reports from medical/emergency personnel.

5. In case of:

- ✓ A fatality;
- ✓ ANY INJURY TO A SPECTATOR;
- ✓ A serious participant injury, no matter how caused;
- ✓ WHEN IN DOUBT, CALL:

LOSS CONTROL

Emergency Evacuation Guidelines

The sudden need to evacuate and secure the track requires planning, authority, and a master plan understood by all. The absence of such can only add to a catastrophe. Sudden need may arise from:

1. Severe weather (electrical or wind)
2. Unexpected catastrophe (such as riot, bleacher collapse, or plane crash)
3. Potential catastrophe (such as bomb threat)

Whichever, the master plan is to bring order into the disorder of the circumstances being suddenly faced.

Decision Maker	On a race day, a chief decision maker must be known, accessible, and with the authority to move within established policies, procedures and criteria for action. Typically, this is delegated to the ranking staff person present, with the chief of security helping to provide important information and implementing the decisions.
Informed Awareness	The security chief should see that information is readily processed as needed to and from designated liaison personnel from the weather station, police/sheriff department, fire department, and emergency medical services. Internally, he/she should organize a communication network with the head usher, gate and parking lot supervisors, concessionaries, major media and key backstretch personnel.
Course of Action	Directions to patrons, facility staff, and backstretch personnel for evacuation must be effective yet as simple as possible, whether out of prudence (bomb threat) or out of reality (earthquake). The routes of evacuation must be monitored against obstruction and be other than the routes of entry by fire, police, and rescue personnel. Plans should include alternatives for blocked routes, attentions to the parking area as well as the facility, securing the vacated premises, and routes for incoming emergency vehicles/personnel. Horse evacuation considerations must be explicit.
Communication System	A "command post" should be planned as the hub for processing all information and directions involving the decision maker, security chief, all liaison personnel, and the track announcer. Radio contact should be ready in lieu of or additional to phone contact. Advance work sessions with all involved should include what local experts and authorities believe is the best way to handle the respective causes of the evacuation to minimize panic among fans, etc.
Evaluation	The best of planning cannot anticipate all glitches, and a practice staff communication exercise is helpful. Also of help would be the sharing of the master plan with a visiting outside expert who can review the plan as it fits the actual facility and community resources. A review of the master plan by all personal sharing responsibility for its implementation should be done before each meet.

WALK-THROUGHS AT MOTORSPORTS TRACKS

The risk of injury in motorsports is not limited to the divers and their crew. Spectators get hurt too, often from unnecessary hazards that need to be found prior to the fact. It is principally “a matter of looking for them,” but some hazards are not as obvious as others. This is one reason why the insurance representative makes periodic visits.

Track owners and special event managers can spare themselves grief by making a “matter of looking for them,” a matter of practice. Designated persons with designated targets of attention can make the periodic walk-throughs of the spectator area an integral part of the operations. Have them see the grounds through the eyes of the excited youngster or the not-so-nimble senior citizen who are more observant of the fan around them than the nitty-gritty of watching their every step. Other considerations may appear more obvious once conscious attention is given to them, such as:

- Potholes or other tripping hazards in the parking area
- Loose/Uneven sewer gates or manhole covers
- Deteriorated or uneven walkways
- Objects protruding into walkways
- Electrical cables and water hoses across walkways

or

- Spills and debris on walking surface around concessions
- Wetness and debris on walking surface in restrooms
- Absence of barriers to restricted areas
- Exposed machinery or electrical transformers
- Unsecured electrical box covers

or

- Deteriorated seating boards in bleachers and grandstands
- Loosened handrails
- Gaps at back or sides of seating areas through which small children can fall
- Poorly lit walking areas, including parking lots
- Exit ways not clearly identified

or

- Electrical connections subject to submersion in water
- Electrical circuits not grounded or without over current protection
- Outdated or discharged fire extinguishers
- Compressed gas cylinders (LP, helium, CO₂) not chained or otherwise secured in the upright position
- Contractors/Sub-Contractors without certificates of insurance

or

- Whatever constitutes an unnecessary hazard that can hurt the people who come to have fun. Don't wait for the professional.

MOTORSPORTS MINIMUM REQUIREMENTS FOR ATTENDEES INCLUDING NON COMPETITION VEHICLES, PIT VEHICLES AND PERSONAL USE RIDING

PRIOR TO ARRIVAL:

- Please read all rules prior to your arrival.
- Please fill out waiver forms located on our website before arrive
- Both parents/legal guardians must complete parental consent waivers.
- Spectators and/or participants on the property hereby assume all risks and injuries or damages resulting there from.

SUGGESTED DAILY RULES:

- Every participant must have completed a waiver form,
- A Posted Speed Limit is recommended in the pits/paddock and parking fields. This rule is for all vehicles, dirt bikes, ATV's, and Side by Sides.
- Set a time for all riding to start and stop on the property. exactly 11am. No riding before or after riding hours have ended.
- Helmets are required on all machines at all times. This includes riding in the pits
- Double riding is only permitted in Side by Sides and 2-up ATV's. All other double riding is not permitted.
- The use of drugs and alcohol is not permitted prior to or during events.
- Do not dump any oil on the ground. The result of draining your oil on the ground is a ? fine.
- Clean up after yourself prior to leaving, please use our trash cans. Do not bring garbage from home to put in our trash disposal cans.
- We ask that all guests use common sense and express courtesy towards their fellow participants



BICYCLES, E-BICYCLES, E-BIKES, AND SCOOTERS

BICYCLES:

- All bicycle riders under 18 must wear a helmet at all times when riding a bicycle.
- No riding during event hours
- Bicycles may be ridden in the pits after hours. All speed limits are in affect for E-bikes with a max of 15 km/h in the pits.

E-BICYCLES:

- E-bicycles are defined as bicycles with battery powered pedal assist. No throttle.
- All E-bicycle riders under 18 must wear a helmet at all times when riding an E-bicycle.
- No riding during event hours.
- All speed limits are in affect for E-bikes with a max of 15 km/h in the pits.

E-BIKES:

- E-Bikes are defined as battery powered bikes that have a throttle. This includes throttle battery powered bikes with pedals.
- All E-bike riders must wear a helmet at all times when riding an E-bike.
- No riding during event hours
- E-bikes may only be ridden inside of designated riding hours.
- All speed limits are in affect for E-bikes with a max of 15 km/h in the pits.

STACYC:

- All Stacyc riders must wear a helmet at all times when riding a Stacyc.
- Stacyc's may only be ridden after event hours.
- Stacyc's are not allowed to be used as pit vehicles.

STAND UP SCOOTERS:

- Stand up scooters are permitted.
- Drivers under 18 must wear a helmet.
- Scooters may only be used in the pits and must be parked at dusk.
- All speed limits are in affect for E-bikes with a max of 15 km/h in the pits.

PIT VEHICLES:

Using your motorcycle, E-bike or ATV as a pit vehicle is prohibited. We want to eliminate the pleasure riding in the pits. Using an ATV for a push/tow vehicles is acceptable.

GOLF CARTS: Suggested rules:

- Recommended that you have a sign-in and pay system for the use of a golf cart PRIOR to allowing the golf kart to be used on your property.
- You must pay per driver, (Each paid driver will receive a wristband that goes on their wrist and not on the cart).
- Driver must be a minimum of 16 years old and have a valid driver's licence to drive a golf cart
- Maximum passengers cannot exceed the amount of seats in your golf cart.
- Golf carts are not permitted after dark.
- ATV's and Sides by sides are not considered Golf Carts and cannot be used as pit vehicles.

ATVs:

- All riders must wear the appropriate helmet.
- Double riding is only permitted in Side by Sides and 2-up ATV's.



SUGGESTED CAMPING RULES:

- Overnight parking (camping) may be permitted
- Suggestion: Every vehicle that parks overnight should register and purchase a camping tag prior to your overnight stay (EVERY VEHICLE).
- Campfires MAY BE allowed, but must be in a raised fire pit, which you must provide. You are responsible to extinguish & clean up pit area.
- Before lighting your campfire, check with staff to confirm that there is no fire ban in place.
- All noise levels at minimal **after ? pm**. We do allow inverters to run all night but if you are using a loud generator, you will be asked to turn it off at **? .**
- Please check ahead for gate closing times, we do not allow overnight guests to arrive after hours.
